A strategic and focused career and technical education (CTE) program should be a fundamental part of any secondary school. According to the Association for Career & Technical Education (ACTE), <u>81 percent</u> of high school dropouts say that they would have stayed in school had they been offered more relevant, real-world learning opportunities.

Incorporating CTE programs into your course offerings will increase student engagement, but only insofar as it applies to your students' everyday lives. For today's students, that means CTE initiatives should align with and promote the 21st-century skills that they need, whether they attend a 2- or 4-year postsecondary program, or if they begin working right after graduation. 


Do you understand how your CTE initiatives fit into the greater picture of 21st-century life and work by utilizing career clusters?



After receiving funding for VariQuest Tools, the Career Academy—a joint venture between Lincoln public school districts and Southeast Community College to provide high school juniors and seniors with credit courses in 16 different career pathways—implemented a professional development program based on common career clusters. Do you coordinate with local universities, community colleges, and postsecondary schools to ensure that your standards cover the basic coursework required by those institutions?


